#### Watching the Watchers

It is about a hundred years since one Mary Richardson, a suffragette, entered the National Gallery and with a meat cleaver attacked the Velasquez painting known as the "Rokeby Venus". This relatively recent acquisition had been valued in 1906 at the, then, immense sum of £45,000. It received five serious cuts but was subsequently restored. I happened to see it on show when I last went to the capital.

The picture is a most arresting image of a female nude viewed from behind. She reclines on a draped couch with her back to us. She gazes into a mirror held before her by a kneeling winged cherub.

First, one notices the striking beauty of her body – but in particular her very pert bottom. It has been described as the most striking in the history of art. Perhaps only then one notices that in the mirror she can herself, as it were, observe the observer observing her! A clever twist in the composition. Perhaps only then, as one looks again at her face, does one notice that it is not as alluring as the rest of her. One is rather caught out by her unexpected plainness. Another clever twist by the artist. Perhaps it is a comment on vanity – in the sense that we are

reminded of the fading beauties of this world and of the flesh.

The picture, whose proper name is the "Toilet of Venus", was painted by the artist in the mid 16<sup>th</sup> Century for the Spanish Court. It later hung in the English country house called Rokeby Park.

The picture's assailant wanted publicity for her movement. The Manchester Guardian, a firm supporter of women's suffrage, called the act one of "imbecility" and a betrayal of the cause.

There's a poignant irony, I think, in the fact that the perpetrator also justified her attack on the grounds that.."the many men visitors gaped at it all day long". Not only had she, apparently, missed the cleverness of the picture, but she unwittingly announced that she had spent a considerable time observing the men observing the image – just like the Venus herself!

An odd sequel to the story is that "Slasher" Mary, as the press dubbed her, later fixed her gaze on the ultra-macho fascist leader of the Blackshirts, Oswald Moseley and became a devoted follower. Curiouser and curiouser!

We have a strong track record of building small developments of sensitively planned homes within the Peak District National Park Authority. You can see examples at Elton, Calver, Bakewell and Tideswell which are all occupied by people with a strong local connection to those villages and towns. The District Council is concerned that there have been very few opportunities to build a small number of affordable homes for local people in the wider Hartington area. However, before any options are considered, we need the community to help us identify what the housing need is. We're calling on local residents to tell us about their housing issues through this survey form.

We are particularly keen to hear from young people interested in setting up a home for the first time, families needing a bigger home, people struggling in high cost rented homes and older people who may have a need to downsize.
