#### **Difficult Times**

As I write this, there is taking place at Canterbury a meeting of the Primates of the Worldwide Anglican Communion. These clerics are Archbishops in numerous countries whose churches look to the Archbishop of Canterbury for a certain sort of leadership. Our Archbishop does not rule our church like an Anglican Pope, but is looked to as a figurehead—rather as the Queen is in the Commonwealth.

I wrote a couple of years ago about the major 'faultlines' in the Anglican Church. In the Church of England itself there has been, over the last twenty years, a major division over the ordination of women to the priesthood. That resulted in significant numbers of traditionally minded clergy and lay people leaving the C. of E. Many went to the Roman Catholic Church — and more recently some whole congregations and sections thereof have joined the Roman Church as part of something called 'The Ordinariate' which Rome has set up specifically to receive Anglicans en masse.

This 'faultline' opened up between those who adhered to a traditional Christian understanding of God's will for men and women and those on the other hand who thought that the Church ought to 'move with the times' and that justice demands that men and women's roles should be interchangeable.

This division between liberals or modernists on the one hand and traditionalists on the other is reflected on a much larger scale in the worldwide Anglican Communion. Outside the relatively liberal or modernist West, many Anglican provinces feel that in

Britain we are 'selling out' on principles of Christian morality – particularly on the issue of toleration of homosexuality. They argue that we are ditching the teaching of 2,000 years so that we can conform to the values of the increasingly secular world around us and seem 'relevant'.

Many of the Anglican Churches which feel this very strongly boycotted the last regular Lambeth Conference. They held their own meeting as a group which goes by the acronym GAFCON.

As I write, none of the GAFCON Archbishops has refused to attend the current Primates' Meeting – but it is feared that there will be walkouts before the end of it. The GATCON General Secretary has asserted, 'Truth matters even more than institutional unity'.

These issues of what are called 'gender and sexuality' are very hot topics indeed and we may see a further serious fracturing of our worldwide communion over the next few years.

Dairy Crest Appeal - Hearing Adjourned -The Hearing of the Appeal by Cathelco against the Refusal of their Application to build 26 houses on the Dairy Crest Site, has run for 3 full days but has now been adjourned until February 1<sup>st</sup> whilst the Inspector seeks clarification on a number of issues. Firstly he is not satisfied that proper tests have been conducted to determine the number and species of bats on the site. Secondly the Appellant at the last minute introduced a number of changes to the plans in an attempt to make them more acceptable, including a third revised design for the large house on Plot SP1. Added to the introduction of the Swale, the Parish Council believe with so many changes this should require a new Application.

In the three days of Hearing the Parish Council and the Peak Park Authority presented a very strong case against the Appeal succeeding. They were supported by several top class speeches from amongst the 40 or so residents who attended each day of the Hearing.

We are no nearer to knowing an outcome or indeed whether the Hearing will continue as a public meeting in the Village Hall on February 1<sup>st</sup> We can however be confident that we have done the best we can!

#### Parish Council

**British Heart Foundation- BHF- Mending Broken Hearts- Annual Sponsored Swim-** This took place at the Arc, Matlock on October 10<sup>th</sup> when for the 5<sup>th</sup> year Hartington C of E Primary School were the "Top School". Thirteen of the children swam alongside Mr

John Dean and raised a magnificent sum. A certificate acknowledging this wonderful achievement was presented to the children by Sophie Jardin from the BHF on Friday 22<sup>nd</sup> January in a school assembly. HYPAC also participated and were placed 2<sup>nd</sup> in the Clubs/Associations Challenge

Defibrillator Training and Cabinet- As mentioned in the previous edition the Parish Council funded further Defibrillator Training for volunteers from the Community. A full list of those who attended is displayed around the village. The Defibrillator is currently situated in The Charles Cotton Hotel. The Parish Council has applied for a grant to purchase a cabinet be used to house the Defibrillator on an outside wall in the centre of the village ensuring it will be accessible 24hours. Hartington C of E Primary School- Another busy term, where pupils learnt more about bullying and the impact that it may have on people's lives during Anti-Bullying Week in November. A quote from one of the pupils "I thought it was a good idea to talk about bullying so that bullies would realise what they were doing was wrong. Also the people that are getting bullied would have the courage to talk to an adult or trusted friend who could sort it out."

A week earlier, the children celebrated "Children In Need" on Friday 13<sup>th</sup> November by dressing as their favourite sports stars including footballers, dancers and horse riders. They each paid £1 to be donated to the cause. A big thank you to local residents for coming together and raising over £1,700 for school provisions during special Christmas events.

Pupils showcased their nativity play 'Straw and Order' on Thursday 10<sup>th</sup> December before the congregation, parents, carers and residents enjoyed a Pea and Pie Supper, organised by the PTFA. Thank you to everyone who donated prizes to the raffle and tombola prizes and supported the evening. A grandparent of one of the pupils said: "I can't believe for such a small school how busy the event was – this school really is the heart of the community." More than £1,243 was raised, in addition to £480 raised at the annual Christmas market on Wednesday 4<sup>th</sup> November.

The children have also created displays to coincide with the village's Christmas tree exhibition this year. They painted pictures of children wearing traditional outfits from countries including Spain, Iceland, Russia, North Korea, Germany, Ukraine and Scotland, alongside portraits of themselves. They spent time researching different areas of the world and the beliefs and customs of people who lived there. They were inspired to paint their own pictures illustrating items like saris in India; fur and animal skins in the Polar Regions and skirts and jewellery in Africa.

Head Teacher, Tracy Blackwell said: "This activity has been a real eye-opener for children and they have learnt so much about the different cultures and the traditions of Christmas all over the world." We have enjoyed hosting the community lunches again and look forward to the next ones on January 29<sup>th</sup>, February 26<sup>th</sup> and March 18<sup>th</sup>

News From Biggin C.E. Primary School -As always, the end of the Autumn Term, with all the excitement of Christmas, was a busy time in school. The Carol Service in Church was well attended. The children sang "Away in a Manger" and another song from the forthcoming play. Two of the Bible readings were also read by school children.

The School Christmas Concert, held in a packed Village Hall on Tuesday, 16<sup>th</sup> December, was The Snow Child. This is a traditional tale from Russia, which emphasises the cycle of the seasons and the annual celebration of Christmas. The staff were really

proud of the children's performance. Each one had a spoken part and joined in the singing. In addition, there were dances, some choreographed by the older children, and musical accompaniments on percussion instruments and recorders. The concert also began with performances by the violin group and music club, led by Claire Kilner, and a guitar solo. The evening ended with refreshments, a raffle and other fundraising activities. As always, the children were well supported by their families and it was an enjoyable community event. It has been my pleasure this year to re-new and make links with two schools in Europe. About six years ago, we started to share emails, then projects with a school in Slovakia. I was delighted when she contacted me again during the summer as she was returning to teaching. We have never met, but I feel we have a good working relationship.

We have also been able to work with a school in Soisysur-Seine, the town twinned with Ashbourne. This has given our children a real opportunity to practise their French. Hopefully, we will meet some of these children in May. Both school links, whether by letter or email, provide them with insight into the lives of children with whom they have much in common but also interesting differences.
