All at Sea.....

A recent Reading from Scripture at Morning Prayer was a passage from the 27th Chapter of the Book of the Acts of the Apostles – the story of the early days of the Church.

Saint Paul had been arrested for preaching Jesus and, under the care of a centurion of the Augustan Cohort, is being sent to Rome for trial.

After days of storms, and having jettisoned the ship's gear, they were adrift in the Adriatic. One night, an angel informed Paul that he will survive – to appear before Caesar – and that none of the 276 souls on board will be lost.

Eventually, they sight land and hope to run ashore on a sandy beach but currents drive them onto rocks and the waves begin to break up the ship. The centurion, Julius, prevents the soldiers from executing the prisoners. He gives orders that those who are able should jump overboard and swim for it. The rest, we are told, came safely to land, clinging to planks and other parts of the ship. No one, in the end, was lost.

This dramatic account of C1st sailing with its mention of winds and tackle and named ports may be of interest to those who sail.

Of course, this account is not really meant to be any sort of parable at all. Nevertheless, the idea of the Christian Church being like a ship at sea is very ancient – it links with the common idea of life being like a journey. The ultimate destination is heaven – but on the way the ship is buffeted by the forces around it and threatened with shipwreck. It is still safer to be inside than outside.

The Church was one and complete for the first thousand years until it split into two and it fragmented further in the C16th. The Church of England has lost many passengers and crew and has further divided in the last 20-odd years. A large body of evangelicals now threatens to break away.

If the vessel of the C of E is on the rocks and breaking up, let's hope that it's an indication that we are not too far from shore and may, in the end, "make it home" clinging to the wreckage!

He informed the Group that on 8th September he would be meeting an old acquaintance, who is a writer, editor and reviewer, who has offered to read through the text and provide his professional opinion. This will help inform how we formulate the presentation of the final document, possible methods of publication, costs, etc. Richard will report back the outcomes of this and subsequent meetings to the Group.

A draft document had been circulated by Richard to the History Group about James Olivers' life and near-shipwreck.

Following the research and publication by Lesley Birch, of her grandfather-in-law's First World War experience, in conjunction with the children of Hartington School amongst others, outline

plans are being made for a possible community/educational visit to Northern France during 2018, to retrace the wartime steps of George Fredrick Birch and possibly others who are listed on the War Memorial.

Liz is sending out a letter on behalf of Hartington Community Group inviting attendance at a **presentation in Hartington Village Hall 25th October at 5.30-6.45pm** which will explain the proposal and invite interest from people who might want to participate in the proposed tour. Members of the History Group are particularly encouraged to attend the presentation, although there is no obligation to sign up for the tour.

Lastly a new project was put on the table- "Who Lived in my House?"- This proposed project, based on regular research sessions with interested residents who might like to build up a knowledge of the former residents of the houses in which they live, which would in turn add to the story of Hartington's past. Possible relocation of the defibrillator in Biggin -A defibrillator and cabinet were purchased through generous fundraising and donations for the benefit of the community of Hartington Nether Quarter Parish.

At the time of purchase, a suitable site was sought to place the defibrillator but this proved a challenge for a variety of reasons: easy/central access, achieving the necessary electricity supply, avoiding theft and vandalism; permission for use of buildings not owned by the parish council; being regularly monitored; obtaining necessary insurance cover; annual service/maintenance and testing of equipment.

In an attempt to meet the above requirements, the defibrillator has been successfully sited outside the property of one of the members of the parish council with regular reviews to ensure optimum placement. As part of the latest review of placement, Hartington Nether Quarter Parish Council seeks the view of the community regarding the possible relocation of the defibrillator and cabinet from Main Street, Biggin to outside of Biggin Village hall on Drury Lane.

If you would like to see the defibrillator relocated to Biggin Village Hall or alternatively, have reasons why it should remain on Main Street, then please submit your opinion, along with your name, to Hartington Nether Quarter Parish Council's website or alternatively, supply your name and opinion to one of the parish councillors prior to the next parish council meeting on 2nd October, to enable an informed

decision to be reached regarding the future location of this vital life-saving equipment.
