The Face of God

A few years ago there was a song in the charts called "One of us" that had the intriguing lyrics:

"If God had a face what would it look like? And would you want to see, if seeing meant That you would have to believe....?"

"What if God was one of us? Just a stranger on the bus Tryin' to make his way back home?"

In the books of the Old Testament (O.T.) it is taken for granted that no one has ever seen the face of God. Of course, God doesn' t have a face in the sense that you and I do. In the more ancient and primitive books God is spoken of as being very close to human beings and He is often described in a very "anthropomorphic" (man-shaped) way In the Book of Genesis the first book of the Bible - God makes all things out of nothing by his word but walks like a man with Adam and Eve in the cool of the day! We are told elsewhere that no one can see God and live - even Moses, the "Friend of God" is only allowed to glimpse Him from behind as he passes by (Exodus 33). Later, God makes Himself known to Elijah in a still calm (1 Kings 19).

Gradually, as the O.T. story unfolds over centuries, there is a theme of God hiding Himself even more completely from mankind. In the Book of Deuteronomy God declares of humanity, "I will hide my face from them: I will see what they will do". In the last three books of the O.T. God makes no appearance in the narrative; indeed, in the last book (of Esther) he is not even mentioned!

The contrast with the advent of Jesus in the New Testament could not be more dramatic. His

birth is foretold and announced by angels and accomplished by divine intervention. His public ministry will be endorsed by miracle after miracle – often witnessed by hordes of people. It seems as though the earlier centuries of wonders have returned. Suddenly, it is like living in the days of Scripture again.

When Jesus' days on earth are over, his followers were able to declare, "We have seen the Glory of God in the face of Jesus Christ".

It is this truth, I suppose, which is expressed poetically in traditional Christian art. The infant Christ lies in a manger – His tiny head radiating golden light.

It is at the heart of the Christian faith that God has shown himself to us in Jesus; he allows us to glimpse Him, only, and live. He presents himself, first, as that most vulnerable and lovable thing, an infant child.

If we could go back in time and stand in the stable and gaze at the child, what would we see? Just an ordinary baby in the squalor of that stable – or the radiant face of God made flesh who transforms his surroundings by the glow of his presence?

As the song quoted asked, if we encountered God as "one of us" in this workaday world, would we <u>want</u> to glimpse his face if it meant we were never the same again? Would we dare to look into the manger?

I hope you glimpse the Christ-child in the midst of all that is tawdry this Christmas – and I hope you enjoy some golden moments with those you love.

The generosity of the community meant we had surplus; the children thought it was a good idea to give this to those in need. To this end it was sent to the food bank in Ashbourne.

Hartington C of E Primary School- Another busy but enjoyable term where the children have been fully involved in every opportunity. The beautiful Wells Dressing of the "Maypole" raised £44.10; Ruby Debes was the Poppy Queen for this year and did an excellent job with her entourage at the Wells Dressing service and the Hartington Sports and Country Show.

We now have 2 after school clubs- on Tuesday it is delivered by Derby County Community Trust and on Thursday Tai-Chi.

Julia Gow from the Wildlife Trust took the children to Hartington Meadow (near to Hartington Station) where they collected wild flower seeds to be sown at School.

Our annual visit to St Giles Church to pack the Harvest boxes was done on September 29th under the watchful eye of Mrs Celia Critchlow.

The MacMillan Coffee Morning, in conjunction with Mrs Bel Kerr, raised the magnificent total of £350. This was followed by a most enjoyable Community lunch when the raffle was drawn and the children delivered a "Bingo" session.

The NSPCC presented a "Speak out- Stay Safe" assembly on 5th October followed by a Workshop for years 5&6 on the 19th October.

Year 6 had a very enjoyable and challenging time at Whitehall and the whole school enjoyed a Tag Rugby taster session on 13th October.

Our year of Gardening Club commenced in October where the children cleared the village planters of the old summer flowers and a few weeks later planted the primulas saved from last year.

The Woodland Trust have sent us 30 saplings to create a hedge alongside the School wall; the children have planned where to place the trees and will nurture them throughout the year.

The PTFA provided a Halloween Party which was held in the Farm Shop.

A celebration assembly was held in Church on the 3rd November, this was attended by parents, governors and many of our Community lunch visitors. It was a really special occasion when the children showed their work in Art and they were presented with certificates acknowledging the contributions they had made in their PE lessons, BiggHarts and Whitehall. The next one will be held on December 1st when we will have a visit from our friend Peace, an international netball athlete from Uganda who is studying at Loughborough University. She will share with the children what it is like to be part of Christmas in school and church in Uganda.

The whole school visited the War Memorial on 10th November at 11am for some minutes of reflection.

On 18th November our annual visit to the ARC for the BHF sponsored swim- we will report on this in the next edition.

As Christmas draws ever closer the whole school, with Elton, will visit "Chesterfield at Christmas"- Derbyshire Environmental Studies Service; the nativity "Tinsel and Tea Towels" will be on 12^{th} December in Church at 6pm, followed by Pea and Pie Supper in School –tickets £5 and £3.

The final Community Lunch for 2017 will be on 15th December when Christmas jumpers are to be worn. The term will conclude with a visit on 18th December to the Opera House at Buxton for the Pantomime- Sleeping Beauty and the school Christmas Party on 19th December.

Hartington C of E Primary School- Ofsted Report- The Head Teacher has been praised by Ofsted for "providing pupils with the best possible opportunities." Ofsted inspector Helen Williams visited Hartington C of E Primary School in October, to assess areas including education, leadership and links with the local community.

Ms Williams addressed her findings to Head Teacher, Tracy Blackwell. She reported: "You and your staff are passionate about providing your pupils with the best possible opportunities and strive for improvement. Assessment information is used to finely target pupils' gaps in learning and, as a result, they make good progress. In the early years, expectations of children are high and, as a result, they settle quickly and make rapid progress."The school is a key part of the community. Pupils are proud to display their work in church. You provide your pupils with many opportunities to learn about different cultures and religions... The curriculum is broad and balanced and designed to interest all pupils."

Mrs Blackwell said: "We are absolutely delighted that our little school, at the very heart of our village community, has been graded 'good' by Ofsted once again. The visit was the first short inspection of the school since our previous assessment in 2013, where we also received a good rating. Everyone involved with the school, from pupils, staff and governors, to local residents and businesses, played a big role in helping us to maintain this high level recognition that it so rightly deserves." The school celebrated its 150th anniversary in July last year with Duke of Devonshire as a guest of honour at a special commemoration event. He said at the time: "This generation of young people are being given the best possible opportunities to study, to learn new skills and to develop to their full potential."

HYPAC- Back in action on September 25th with a full complement of 30 children aged between 8-13yrs and 8 newly trained Level 2 leaders. For the first time in our 9 years we have needed to create a waiting list for new members who become 8 years of age. We welcome a new secretary, Mrs Vicky Critchlow and want to thank our treasurer Mr Alan Ollerenshaw for ensuring we have fully documented accounts. These two voluntary positions are critical, alongside our constitution, to ensure we are able to apply for grants. Without these grants we would not be able to provide such a range of opportunities for our young people.

This year so far we have visited Mouldridge Mine at Pikehall, had the Portable Climbing Wall and KMX Bikes courtesy of the excellent "Adventur" Team from Chesterfield and a course of Archery provided by the Scout leaders. All of this alongside the more traditional activities of Football, Basketball, Hockey, Dodgeball and circuit training.

We are looking forward to our annual Christmas treat to Megazone in Derby on December 4th. Lastly I would like to say thank you to the following parents who have volunteered to attend some of the sessions to support the young leaders; Mrs Helen Debes, Mrs Sandra McCurrach, Mr Dan Blackwell, and Mrs Vicky Critchlow. Hartington Village Hall

This fantastic facility in the heart of the village, was left as a Charitable Trust to the Village almost 100 years ago and as such is owned by the Community of Hartington. However in recent years it has struggled to generate sufficient funds to cover operating expenses and certainly not enough to update and refurbish the facilities. At the same time the burden of managing and operating the Hall has fallen on fewer and fewer shoulders.

It is critical that wider support and more help in running the Hall is obtained. At present there are only 3 Committee members and Trustees plus a few residents helping with opening and cleaning.

In an effort to address the worsening financial position and to gain wider support there have been two recent meetings involving all groups who use the Hall plus representatives from, the Parish Council, village businesses and current Trustees.

Both meetings were attended by around 20 people who were very concerned about the current financial position which puts the very future of the Hall at risk. They examined ways in which there can be better promotion of the Hall, including plans for a new website with automated booking and ways of seeking grants for renovating and improving the premises.

The first step however is to elect a new Village Hall Committee, as at least two of the current three members wish to step down. The committee should by Trust have a larger number of villagers and the more people involved the easier it is to share the load and run the Hall successfully. We also need people who can help out with duties on an occasional or rota basis. "Many hands make light work"

We will shortly be calling a Village Hall EGM to decide how to take matters forward and to elect a new Committee. Leaflets will be distributed with the date and we hope that many more of our residents will attend, at least to hear the position, help with ideas and hopefully give a small amount of their time in the future to keep the Hall going.

It is *your* Village Hall but without your support it is at genuine Risk!
