I was asked recently what the element "mas" means in words such as "Christmas" and "Candlemas". It is, of course, short for the word "mass" – a very common ancient term for Holy Communion.

Where the word *mass* came from and what it originally meant has occasioned much inconclusive speculation over the years. Some authorities connected the word with the Hebrew term *missah* – an "oblation", or offering. Others suggested a link with the old English *maesse* – a feast.

We know for certain – from the evidence of some very early service books – that the word "mass" could originally indicate almost any part of the solemn worship offered by the Church. Thus, the Latin version *missa* was variously

applied - to the Scripture readings; to those particular prayers called Collects; to the regular "Offices" said by the monks and so on.

Eventually, the word "Mass" came to refer only to the <u>principal</u> service of the Church; the Holy Communion. The word itself <u>seems</u> to come originally from the Latin phrase with which the people heard the priest dismiss them, "Ite missa est".

Perhaps it is not wholly inappropriate that something so mysterious as the Holy Communion is often called by a word which is rather mysterious in itself!

HARTINGTON NEIGHBOURHOOD PLAN PRESENTATION IN VILLAGE HALL

Saturday 10 FEBRUARY - 10 to 4 pm and Sunday 11 FEBRUARY - 11 to 2pm

are making good progress on our Neighbourhood Plan which, once approved by the majority of residents, will be part of the Peak Park's Planning Policy for this village. Our presentation will cover the results of our Questionnaire, ideas for a Village Development Boundary, which green spaces need protection and many of the other policies you will vote for in a referendum on the Plan, probably in the spring/summer of this year. Now is your time to comment and influence our thoughts before the Plan is finalised. Please just walk in and see the boards detailing our progress to date. Members of the Parish Council and Neighbourhood Plan Steering Group will be there to answer your questions.

Hartington Village Hall update - Following concerns over the financial viability of the Village Hall, which has made operating losses over the past two years, together with the resignation of two of the three trustees, an Emergency General Meeting was held on 4th January. At a well-attended meeting, with most of the current groups that use the Hall being represented, a new group of seven Trustees were elected. They are Keith Quine (Chair), Liz Broomhead (Secretary), Garry Booth (Treasurer), Anna Wardle, Andy

Farmer, Leon Goodwin (Bookings Administrator) and Sarah Lacey. In addition a further eleven individuals offered to join a wider Management Group that is representative of almost all the current local user groups. However it must be stressed that any individual can join either as a Trustee or member of the Management Group at any point in time by approaching Liz, our Secretary, in the first instance.

The viability of the Village Hall, set up as a charity for the benefit of the community, is totally dependent on the time, energy and skill sets of volunteers. Having already taken steps to reduce, where possible, costs the trustees, who next meet on 23rd January at 6.00 in the Bakehouse, face some difficult decisions. It has become clear that we need to address long standing issues such as replacing a 40+ year old boiler and to undertake a complete kitchen refurbishment. Such developments will only be possible through successful grant applications which usually require a degree of matched funding.

Among the current trustees there is a healthy mix of skills and experience including project management, successful bid writing, previous charity experience and event organisation. However it is clear that we will need to come up with a new charging structure as well as establish a series of fund raising activities to build up the matched funding needed to underpin a successful bid. We are delighted to announce a new collaboration with 'The Farming Life Centre' based in Bakewell which, on Tuesday 27th February at 1.00 will see a 'Rural Social Group' established to come together monthly in our Village Hall.

PTFA- As always the PTFA has been very active in organising fund raising events to support our village school. The Christmas Fare, held in the Village hall on December $3^{\rm rd}$ was a resounding success and included a visit from Father Christmas. A grand total of £633 09 was raised. After the School Nativity in Church, the annual Pie and Pea Supper and Raffle Draw was held; an amazing total of £1,400 was achieved. The PTFA is very grateful to everyone who came and supported these event as well as the donators of the generous prizes for the Raffle. Thank You.

Christmas Tree Festival- The Christmas tree festival which was held in St Giles Church, Hartington at the beginning of December was once again a huge success. commenced with a vintage tractor run on the Saturday afternoon, and a display of vintage static engines on the village green. Following the light up of the beautiful tree in the village centre, mulled wine and mince pies were enjoyed in the Church whilst people wandered around the 20 trees, which had been decorated by groups and businesses in the village to depict "Merry Christmas". The original ideas for decorating the trees never cease to amaze me, and included "The Ghost of Christmas Past, Jingle Bells, Snowman, Scents of Christmas, Reindeer to name a few.

On Friday, 15th December the "Sing along Carols" was held in the Village Hall, with entertainment provided by Philip Goodwin and Margaret Partridge, with special solo pieces Courtney Slack and Harry Wardle. A buffet was enjoyed and a special visitor also arrived to give presents to the elder members of the community. celebrations altogether raised £500+for Hartington Community Group. As always the lead into Christmas is hectic but very exciting and enjoyable. Alongside the preparations for the festive time, Years 5&6 took part in Bikeability - Level 2 which involved training out on the village roads, years 3&4 undertook Level 1 which took place in the school yard on a very cold freezing day. Every 6 weeks we are holding a Celebration Assembly, whenever possible in Church. Our last one was held on the 1st December in school, because it was so cold. We had an excellent attendance of Governors, Parents and friends. This coincided with the

Termly visits from Peace Proscovia - A Uganda International Netball player who is based at Loughborough University. She shared with the whole school "Christmas in her Uganda Village" she visited the church and saw the Christmas Trees and Childrens display. The children are following up with letters this term and we are planning for the children to track Peace and her Uganda Team when they participate in the CWG in the Gold Coast.

The PTA Christmas Market raised £632.37 after expenses. The School Nativity "Tinsel & Tea Towels" (Ofsted came calling) was followed by Pea & Pie Supper in School which raised £1400.72 after expenses. Thank you to everyone who donated prizes or helped in any way at both events. Sadly 2 events had to be cancelled due to the bad weather- our visit to "Chesterfield at Christmas" and the Sports Plus Festival.

Community Lunch was Christmas Lunch combined with a Christmas Jumper Day in aid of Children in Need. It was an excellent affair with music provided by our temporary caretaker, Graham Hipkiss-Hicks, on the French horn. A Christmas Raffle was followed by a Christmas Bingo session both of which were conducted by key stage 2 children. The New Year has brought many new and exciting opportunities, the first of which was the Change 4 Life (C4L) Conference for 2 Year 5 Pupils, Niamh Mellor and Winola Watkinson, Mrs Broomhead took them to the ARC where they were given training and support in how to run a "C4L Sports Club" This will ensure that every child is receiving 30 minutes of physical activity every day and gaining an understanding of Healthy Eating. MAST continue to provide excellent collective worships each month, which are interactive with the children. The first Community Lunch of 2018 was held on January 26th. Rachel Wilkes, Music Partnership, is providing a 10 week programme of Curriculum Music and we continue to run Tai Chi Sessions both in the curriculum and after school. Derby County Community Trust also continue to deliver sport on Tuesdays with an after school club. This term the children are enjoying dance and gymnastics.

We were sad to hear of the death of Mrs Ruth Prime; such a lovely lady who had attended our

Community Lunches for many years. The children would enjoy talking with her over lunch, especially about her favourite football team Manchester City. The two other city fans, Jacob and Maddie, would sit either side of her at the table and help with her raffle tickets and bingo when we played. The Manchester City scarf, which Jacob gave her, she took with her into the Care Home at Great Longstone. She also enjoyed meeting many of the older members of the community who were at lunch and talked through fond memories of her life in Hartington. She will be missed by us all.

The Farming Life Centre- Have you heard of our small, but well established charity nestled amongst the hustle and bustle of the Agricultural Centre in Bakewell? We have a friendly team of staff who can provide health, well-being and business related information and support to the farming and rural communities of the Derbyshire and Staffordshire Peak District. In all our work we strive to improve the resilience of the rural community by supporting residents of all ages and their families to deal with their challenges in a timely way.

Over the years the charity has successfully developed and run projects in the fields of mental and physical health, heritage, the arts, business support and development, skills development and confidence building. During the last year we reached over 300 rural residents and farming families. One element of our work which has proved to be very effective are our 'Rural Social Groups'. We have several established groups around Derbyshire which are well attended by residents of rural and farming communities. They are a great way to meet new people, catch up with friends, share memories, listen to guest speakers and occasionally visit local pubs and cafes for a meal out.

We are very much looking forward to launching a new 'Rural Social Group' in Hartington; with the first meeting being on Tuesday 27th February, 1pm – 3.pm in the Village Hall. Please come

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
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BIGGIN NEWS

Biggin C of E Primary School - The last weeks of November and school days in December were dominated by Christmas activities and most
