In each edition we will do a special feature of one of our sponsors- this time The Charles Cotton Hotel-Hartington- the next edition. The Waterloo Inn- Biggin and then the Ouiet Woman – Earl Sterndale

Charles Cotton Hotel

The Old- The building was an old farmhouse until the licence from the original Bulls Head was transferred from Dale House. In 1803 "Hartington Book Club" held a Dinner at The Bulls Head- this name which was still used in 1846. In 1860 an extension was built by Mr Sleigh- the restaurant/function room- the opening of this was marked by a "Celebratory Ball" and was now known as The Sleigh Arms. The name changed again to Charles Cotton by 1888 when the proprietor was Mr Wardle. There is photographic evidence of a horse drawn post trap outside the Charles Cotton- the first post office in the village was at the property opposite- now Dauphin Antiques. Music and Dances were regular features, especially during the 50's and 60's. There is a Ticket dated 28th December 1936 for the Blue Carlton Band from Sheen, price 1/6d (6pence approx.) Money raised for the Derbyshire Royal Infirmary.



In the 50's & 60's, Saturday evenings would see local musicians playing in the bar- Ron and Eileen Riley, Fred Birch to name some.

A New Year's Eve Dinner Dance was held on 30th December 1967 in aid of Muscular Dystrophy. Tickets were priced at 25/- today £1.25p

"Nasty, Brutish and Short?"

Last year I attended a lecture in Taddington given by the archaeologist who had excavated part of the flattish summit of the nearby hill called Fin Cop. He took the view that the skeletons uncovered, many of which were female, were evidence of prehistoric genocide. He noted that many in his profession wanted to believe that in prehistoric times, before more complex power structures and "wicked capitalism" came into existence, human beings were peaceful and cooperative with each other. I think he felt that sometimes colleagues' political assumptions blinded them to the evidence. All of this is a reminder, I suppose, that although archaeology is a science, <u>interpretation</u> of finds and evidence takes us into the realm of <u>ideas.</u>

In the so-called "Age of Reason" (in the 18th Century) thinkers held human reason and learning in great reverence but many also believed in the notion of the "Noble Savage" – the idea that in the very distant past peoples had lived in a sort of innocent, childlike world as yet uncorrupted by sophistication. Others on the other hand regarded "uncivilised" peoples as having been brute-like.

In the C17th, the philosopher Thomas Hobbes believed that primitive life had been a "war of all against all" and, as he famously said, "solitary, poor, nasty, brutish and short."

By contrast, Lord Shaftesbury (politically a Whig) had believed that moral goodness was innate in people – a view drawn partly, perhaps, from the classical notion of a lost Arcadia.

These issues were brought to mind for me recently when reading homicide statistics. The yearly rate of murder in the modern UK is only (!) about 1 per 100,000 (we wish it were nil, of course).

We live in a society with long established, tested and adjusted (though far from perfect) institutions. In the younger US, the rate is four to five times higher. In Honduras it is estimated to be 90 times higher than ours. Yearly rates of 300 - 1,000 per 100,000 have been reported for the Yanomami of Brazil and a similar rate for the people of Papua, New Guinea. The Kato, a Native American people of California seem to have had a murder rate of nearer $1 \frac{1}{2}$ thousand in 1840! But was that before or after contact with civilised foreigners? And what became of the Kato?

We're right to be concerned about knife crime in our cities but the chances of being murdered in most of the UK are reassuringly slim.

I believe that the Christian view that we are all too capable of sin unless we're subjected to moral education and other pressures is only too true. Our long – established society and its structures not only serve to protect us from the outside world but from each other and even, sometimes, from ourselves. I for one am more with Hobbes than Shaftesbury, but what about you?

Farming Life

Spring has finally sprung and summer is just around the corner. So in my garden it's full on chick time! I have every stage going on all at once, hatching, growers and mother hens. I grow all my hatchlings onto adults including the cockerels and choose a few to keep for their egg colour and the rest are rehomed to pastures new.

I admit to having a slight obsession with coloured eggs so I breed chickens specifically for variations in shell colour, I currently have olive, blue, white, brown and mint green egg layers but my current egg hatching mission is to hatch a very dark brown egg layer, you may wonder why I bother when inside the egg is exactly the same regardless of shell colour but I'm addicted and must have my chocolate coloured layer!

This egg mission has been thwarted recently by a mysterious unseen visitor ...

I have a mixed bunch chickens, a positive menagerie of shapes and colours. Everything from rescues, cross bred rainbow egg layers through to award winning orpingtons, all living happily in my garden and often found munching through my vegetable patch; that was until the uninvited visitor started a prowling. He has become something of an unseen urban legend in Biggin; we think it's a stoat. My farmer neighbour sadly lost his ducks to him and I was luckier and only lost three hens (you may have heard me in the waterloo inn wailing into my Guinness lamenting the loss of my favourite prize winning Orpington). So with the help of my neighbourly Mr Farmer we hatched a catching the stoat plan. This was somewhat unsuccessful, as with my borrowed humane trap I caught my dog twice and one of my own hens and Mr Farmer caught his sons cat and someone else's hen!

I'd like to add in the past Mr Farmer has caught many a predator ...but even with his help and my Stanedge Grange chicken chunk with peanut butter coated treats I failed miserably to entice the stoat into my trap.



So despite my rather lame stoat catching attempt and my garden being full of chicken nugget sized chicks as I write this, touching wood at every opportunity, I'm sleeping a little easier as "Mr Stoat" seems to be eating someone else's chickens at the moment or has been caught elsewhere as he's mysteriously disappeared. But those of us with chickens know the Biggin stoat or sly old Mr fox are an ever present danger. We all have our own ways of deterring & keeping our flocks safe, I've heard everything from mint to urine being used, along with the more traditional electric fence option!

I take a rather pragmatic approach, I'm resigned to sadly losing some chickens to the stoat or fox, half my salad crop to the visiting rabbits and entire pots of pansies to my chickens...accepting I have to share

seems to be the stress free way forward in my garden and I'm enjoying it all the more now I'm planting enough to share...maybe we should all plant an extra one for the uninvited visitor...they always seem to leave me just enough.

Recipes

"Bliss for me cake!" Using a 25cm round, loose bottomed cake tin, well-buttered and lined with lining paper the following ingredients will be baked in oven 170C (150 fan) or Gas 3 ¹/₂. 2-3 Ripe Pears, peeled and halved with 2 tblspn Demerara Sugar; 180grm unsalted butter; 180grm soft brown sugar;90 grm of Golden Syrup & Black Treacle; 2 tspns of Ground Ginger; 3 eggs beaten together; 270grm Ground Almonds; 90grms Plain Flour ³/₄ tspn Bicarbonate of Soda.

Method- sprinkle the sugar over the base of the buttered, lined tin and place the pears core side down (having removed the core) on top of sugar. Put butter, sugar, syrup, treacle into a pan with 2 tblspn of water and bring to the boil for 3 minutes. Remove from the heat and cool for 10minutes, then add ginger & beaten eggs mixing well. Sir in ground almonds, sift in the flour and bicarb, mix well. Quickly scrape mixture over the pears giving the tin a little "shoogle" to remove air pockets. Bake for 50-70mins depending on firmness of pears, until cake feels firm. If edges darken too much turn down heat to 160C/Gas 3. Cool in tin, turn out and serve in a slice with ginger, ice cream, or fresh cream. Sarah Lacey

From the WI Recipe Book- Chicken Mildred- 1 cooked chicken, flesh removed and cut into pieces, 1 tin of Condensed celery Soup and 1 of Mushroom soup, 1 tin of water chestnuts including liquid, 1 cup of mayonnaise, 1 dessert spoon of curry powder. Topping- 20z -50grms of butter, 20z -50grms – cornflakes, 20z - 50grms- chopped almonds. Then, place chicken in oven proof dish, mix soups, chestnuts, mayonnaise, curry powder together and pour over chicken. Fry cornflakes and almonds in butter then sprinkle over the chicken. Bake at 170C gas 3 for 25-30 minutes. Biggin WI.

Peal of bells. On Tuesday June 17th the eight bells of St Giles will ring out in a full peal of 5000 changes, only the second time such a thing has been attempted at the church. The peal will commence at mid-day and is expected to take three hours to complete.

Change-ringing is a challenging exercise, requiring intense concentration as well as rhythmical timing and a certain amount of physical strength and coordination.

A change consists of the eight bells ringing in turn, just once each in a predetermined order, with the order varying from one change to the next. The objective is for each of the eight ringers, who have been drawn from across the country, to ring their bell precisely in its correct place at every one of the 5000 changes, according to a complex pattern called a "method" which has to be memorised beforehand. No artificial aids to memory are allowed, nor any physical assistance from other people, nor indeed any breaks for a rest. To be counted as valid the whole of the peal must be rung in one block without interruption, and with no two changes alike. So the venture is by no means guaranteed to succeed!

In the event of success the performance will be credited to the Derby Diocesan Association of Church Bell Ringers.
