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## **Earl Sterndale Chapel**

In 1787 John Wesley visited Longnor and many were converted to Methodism. Two of these visited Earl Sterndale weekly to hold prayer meetings and Rowland Heathcote was one of these converted. He opened his farm for regular worship; by 1789 preachers were coming weekly from Burslem and a class of 11 members was established under the leadership of Heathcote. On his death in 1820 he left an annuity of £100 to pay for food and lodging for visiting preachers.

Thomas Johnson, a miller from Glutton Bridge, bought "100 sq yds, more or less, being part of a garden", from



John Bagshaw of Chapel Cottages- the cost  $\pounds 7$  -10 shillings. A Wesleyan Chapel was built on this site in 1850 – one of the trustees, William Johnson, left  $\pounds 200$  when he died in 1876. Miss Moreton of Buxton conducted a week of revival services, also attended by William Edge (praying Billy) of Ladmanlow. To quote him -"I went on Friday night with my concertina to have a good open air mission. I walked 5 miles each way and took half a dozen unsaved young men with me. They all got saved"

In 1917, due to the irregular attendance of the harmonium player, they were asked to resign and Miss Stone was appointed. She retired in 1977 after 70 years as caretaker.

A quote for £8 to install electricity in 1932 was rejected; electricity eventually installed in 1947. Records show, in 1932, the Sunday School teacher and organist was Mrs Wain. A lady of great repute, well known in the area for her kindness and described as "Having a heart of gold". In 1942-45 the chapel was used as a First Aid station. In 1950 the Centenary Celebrations were held Rev'd J Swarbrick (former Sunday school pupil) was the guest speaker. Attendance was good and the grand total of £27-2-2d was raised. In 1970, Mrs Wain suggested the pews should be removed to accommodate the large numbers at Sunday school. This took place in 1975, the floor was levelled and a kitchen and toilets were built.

**Life today supporting worship and the Community**. It is proud of its multi-purpose function, letting fees supporting the maintenance.

**Worship**- Sunday services, shared with Hollinsclough, are held alternate weeks, "Messy Church" is held monthly with the help of Deacon Lorraine Brown. The theme is illustrated by the children's art and craft which is displayed around the wall. Every December the schoolchildren and staff enjoy a Christingle Service. **Community and Visitors**- A wide range of activities put this chapel at the heart of the Community. Parish Council Meetings, Polling Station, Fund Raising events and parties are accommodated. The Wednesday walkers are able to access the toilets and facilities and it is used by the Bullock Smithy Scouts Hike from Hazel Grove as an annual stopover checkpoint. The monthly Wednesday coffee morning 10.30-12 is very popular.

# Tales from the Fields



As winter draws to a close, signs of spring are everywhere. Early lambs have appeared in the fields, the daffodils are flowering and brightening the paths and gardens. Winters can be long here and over the five years I've lived here I've become some what of a prepper, not because I think the end of the world is nigh, but because since moving to a small derbyshire village I face an hours round trip if I've ran out of something at 6pm. so I now obsessively freeze things. I batch cooking to save time. I cook simple meals like cottage pie, soups, chilli etc in a huge pot, (like I'm feeding five thousand not just a small family) its then sealed into reusable plastic freezer tubs so I have homemade midweek evening meal in minutes. I freeze

everything, milk, eggs, butter. If There's too much of something and it may go to waste, its put in the freezer.

When the first wave of corvid-19 panic buying fever took hold of the world I felt calmly prepared, in fact my teenage daughter suggested, our whole village would probably survive isolation on our freezer food alone!

That's how living rurally and becoming more environmentally aware has changed me, I grow veg/salad myself and I am now more considerate in my shopping choices, I buy locally produced meat/produce whenever possible and I use it completely without any waste. Years ago, this was the norm yet in the UK alone we bin 10.2 million tons of food, that's around 1/3 of all food bought. Not just a waste of food but a waste of money!

An example of new found thrifty save the world ways is my chicken and vegetables for Sunday dinner- it will also make the Monday leftovers chicken pie, and the bones will be used to make the stock for gravy, leftover

vegetables are whizzed up and made into veggie burgers so there is virtually no waste, the chicken [and my usually homegrown] vegetable lived a good life and they were all treated with respect by using it all.

I have experienced first hand how long it takes to raise a free range chicken for the table and witness daily how hard local farmers work to care for the animals that becomes the meat on our plates. Produce bought from local companies means I support my local economy and if I've grown the veg myself. I've not only saved money but ensured freshness. These small things minimise my impact on our world through a smaller carbon footprint.

So, with signs of spring everywhere it feels like the world is waking up, let's all try to make a few positive changes to take care of our beautiful earth.

### **Hartington News**

**St Giles Church, Hartington Survey of the Community by PCC.** The purpose of the survey was to gauge support within the community for three possible projects relating to the church building which the PCC had identified. These projects were intended to make the church more welcoming, both for Sunday worship and for village events. The projects identified were: Installing a toilet; Improved kitchen facilities; Improvements to the heating system. There were 24 returns and the results are as follows

(1= most important, 3 least) heating is felt to be the most important, some of the comments emphasised this-

• Heating would provide a more welcoming environment, which in turn may encourage donations. If chosen, the system proposed should be as environmentally friendly as possible. Running cost would also be a big consideration

- Toilet important. Village hall for other use.
- Many people find it difficult to have to go down to the village hall for its facilities e.g. at a funeral
- Welcome young people to a warm church
- More welcoming yes but will more locals come?

• To encourage use, heating is important. A kitchen would allow hot drinks etc. Although a toilet is important, there are alternative facilities around until money allows a later construction.

The PCC would like to thank those who took the time to complete a form and return it. Some years ago, the PCC commissioned a consultant to look at the heating, produce an outline scheme and gave us a cost estimate of around £40,000. The PCC did not pursue it at the time as it was concerned about the roof repairs, which it felt had to be a priority. The scheme was based on a similar scheme installed in Ashbourne Church, which was very successful and could be controlled from home. As the initial survey has already been done, this could be up and running fairly quickly once sufficient funds have been raised. Next steps - The PCC will be organising Fund Raising events to access the finances required. It will also investigate grants, which may be available and this survey will help with the application process. Your support is always much appreciated and essential to realise the improvements to our church.

VE commemoration in Hartington May 8-11<sup>th</sup> – Well this is what we had planned!! It is highly unlikely to happen at this time BUT what we are thinking is having a VC (Victory over Coronavirus) Day when it is safe to do so. At the heart of it all was to be the "Royal British Legion" and their National Commemoration Programme. This may no longer happen. Alongside this the Community Group, Village hall and businesses had put together an exciting programme for village folk and visitors alike. There are lots of ways you can get involved- a little or a lot it is up to you... So...

**On Friday 8<sup>th</sup> May** – we would have held a parade from the British Legion to the War Memorial; "Hartington Sings" a presentation of 1940's songs on the Village Green. At the Charles Cotton Hotel we were to hold a War Time Pizza with 40's live music and a WW2 Tank- If you arrive dressed in 40's outfit then a discount on your pizza. To set the scene for the holiday weekend, especially for the street party on Sunday 10<sup>th</sup> around the pump and village greens. We have bunting to decorate the houses and businesses, particularly around the Market Square and pond for when we are able to stage the celebrations. We may still organize "The Big Village Party" to be held in the Village Hall, 8 until late. Again, "40's" dress will be much appreciated and there will be entertainment across the decades with a focus on the "40's". CALLING ALL BAKERS! WAR TIME **BAKE OFF!** PRIZES. The judging will take place at the Street Party on the greens on Sunday afternoon -2-4pm – Details of the "Bake Off" will be in the next edition. We will still be presenting commemoration mugs from the Parish Council to the children of the village before the summer holidays. We were also planning a Flower Festival over the four days, an informative exhibition of historical material showing village life in the 1940s, and a new World War 2- "who lived in our house" walking trail through the village. We have secured grants to support our community celebrations. We will keep the community informed through this publication and by social media as our plans become firmer. So, something to look forward to.....

**Hartington Village Hall Lottery:** We are delighted that both our February and March winners of our lottery in support of a new roof are lifelong residents of Hartington. Kath Bassett, Digmer Farm, was our February winner while Marion Gibbs, Hall Bank, was our March winner. Our next two draws take place on Wednesday 8<sup>th</sup> April and Wednesday 13<sup>th</sup> May.

**Hartington Village Hall:** regular readers will know that we first applied for planning permission to replace our leaking roof back in August. After various delays the outcome of our Section 73 application to use lightweight tiles (Etex Eternit Rivendale slate) has now been granted. Ashbrook Roofing of Darley Dale are our chosen contractor and we are, weather permitting, looking to an early April start. We are so very grateful to all members of the community who have supported us in this venture, be it through buying a lottery ticket, attending one or more fund raising events, local businesses who donated auction items, hosted events (Charles Cotton Hotel) or simply by giving us the encouragement to persevere. We have recently acquired a sound system for the Hall, courtesy of Adie Crowe. His extremely generous donation of a professional sound system was tried out at our February Rural Social Group meeting, where the guest speaker from the Air Ambulance Service, Pete Corbett, clearly went down well with the group. A total of £292.95 was donated to the Air Ambulance – a fantastic total. If that can be the impact of a great new sound system then we can look forward to it's use at all future meetings and concerts.

Future Rural Social Group meetings are threatened by the risks associated with coronavirus. We have cancelled the meeting scheduled for 24<sup>th</sup> March (Role of Women on the land during WW2), while those on 28<sup>th</sup> April (the ever popular Alan Salt on cheese making), and 26<sup>th</sup> May (Derbyshire Scam watch) are under review. We will confirm decisions through the village websites and social media. A new feature of future meetings will be members of Digital Hartington being available to advise individuals on issues to do with use of laptops, iPads or mobile phones.

Not content with getting a new roof we are also planning to replace our ancient heating system. This initiative was launched at Rob Tenty's birthday party/Boiler Bash on 14th March. A very large attendance was entertained by three DJs, including Rob. An auction and two raffles were exceptionally well supported, both in terms of donations from 17 local and regional organisations and individuals, as well as by the enthusiastic party-goers. A total of £2500 was raised towards the new heating system, which will cost in the region of £15K. All connected to the Hall are most grateful to Rob and Kate Tenty for their drive and energy in organising a great night. We also want to thank the amazing DJ's alongside Rob, namely DJ Dom from "No way Back" and DJ Jodie, "Abba Queen of Biggin". A great example of having a load of fun while supporting a worthy cause. Thanks also to all from the community who came and gave so generously, to Jill for running the bar, Liz and Fiona for raffle sales, and so many others who assisted at some stage of the event.

Several regular groups that use the Hall such as Badminton and Pilates have suspended activity for the foreseeable future. We will keep access to the Village Hall under review.
