God in Jesus, "The same yesterday, today and tomorrow"

I was lucky enough to spend February with the Anglican monks at Mirfield in Yorkshire. There was a diet of four or five services each day, mealtimes and private prayer, meditation and reading.

One of the things I read which gave food for thought was an old argument put forward by David Jenkins who was a controversial, radical Bishop of Durham. He was arguing in the early 1990s that the Church should ignore the practice of 2000 years on the grounds that God is not in the past but only in the present and future! I was astounded by this assertion on the lips of a Christian clergyman. It is fundamental to the idea of God in the Jewish, Christian and Moslem religions that God stands outside time in eternity but also inhabits time which is his creation.

Leaving aside the very nature of God, there is human experience. Human beings are sometimes conscious of God's presence in the present and they "see" Him in faith and hope in the future and also at the end of time. They also very much see God when contemplating the past in which He revealed and reveals Himself. The Old Testament Scriptures were mostly written a significant time after the events they deal with in

Jewish history. Looking back, the people of Israel could "see" God clearly in their national life. The Christian Scriptures were written merely decades after the time of Christ - but early Christians "saw" God in the Jesus of the (recent) past, - and millions still do.

Ordinary people can often see a pattern, a purpose, a meaning when they look back on their lives which they couldn't see at the time.

The same day as I read the words of Bishop Jenkins, I picked up a newspaper which told of how three Americans on holiday in France saved countless lives when a man with a machine gun burst into their carriage. As luck – or providence – would have it, two were soldiers and tackled the man – whose gun jammed.

These heroes of the hour were deeply moved by their experience. Looking back they felt that their whole lives had been a preparation to put them in just the right place at the right time. Their faith was deepened.

I wonder whether the late Bishop Jenkins, from the vantage point of eternity, can now see purpose in his own past and God inhabiting it!

Hartington Town and Nether Quarter Parish Councils

Hartington Nether Quarter Parish Council would like to raise awareness of an increase in the number of cases of dog fouling in Biggin village. Unfortunately, this is causing a significant problem on the pavement on the approaches to Biggin Primary School. This is a serious health hazard for young children. In addition, parents have reported the obvious irritation of children's shoes becoming 'soiled' and the consequences of this are unpleasant.

Hartington Town Quarter Parish Council has also received complaints about dog fouling in Hartington village, particularly in the vicinity of Bankside and Dig Street.

It is appreciated that there are many responsible dog owners in both parishes; however, a minority may be either allowing/accidentally allowing their dogs out unsupervised or are failing to 'pick up' after their dogs have fouled pavements and public spaces.

As detailed on local authority notices placed on waste bins and various poles in the parishes, all

the bins in both parishes are now dual-purpose bins and can be used to deposit sealed dog waste bags. These notices also advise that there is a fine associated with permitting dog fouling in public places.

Both parish councils are, therefore, appealing to all dog owners to try to act responsibly, for the benefit and health of both communities, particularly vulnerable young people.

Hartington Village Hall Update - Very encouraging progress has been made by our trusty volunteers in the past 10 weeks. We have completed a range of necessary administrative tasks and reorganisation of the kitchen and storage areas to the benefit of future users of the Hall. The first of our new monthly **craft fairs** takes place on **Saturday 21st April from 11.00** and we hope many of you will come along and browse. A further event of considerable local and regional interest will occur on **5th May** when Alan Salt will hold an **exhibition relating to the former cheese factory**. In addition, members of the History Group will be present to show their research into various aspects of our community.

The Village Hall is still interested in further volunteers coming forward from the community, most notably to 1. Join our cleaning teams. 2. Join our occasional maintenance days to tackle a variety of tasks both inside and outside. We need both experienced individuals as well as enthusiastic and willing volunteers. We have decided to submit an application for a grant from the Garfield Weston Foundation. It is their 60th anniversary of supporting voluntary community groups and to celebrate they are offering a number of grants that do not require matched funding. Our Management Group has discussed a range of possible initiatives including a full kitchen refurbishment, relocating the kitchen, replacing the 40+ year old boiler plus radiators as well as improving insulation, a full electrical rewire, and the possibility of replacing the asbestos roof tiles plus adding insulation. Before deciding on the final initiative to put forward we are consulting our user groups to see which option finds most support.

We next meet on 10th April so if any reader wishes to contribute to the consultation let Liz know in writing please. We do have forms available that outline the options so far considered. We have until June to make our application, with decisions becoming known by October. Even if unsuccessful, and the odds are long, we feel that the process is invaluable and can support other applications in the future.

Hartington Through Time-We are making progress with our research on "who lived in our house", and have started to gather information on quite a few properties in the village. On Saturday 5 May, we will have a small exhibition in the

Village Hall, alongside the Cheese Factory exhibition, where you will be able to come and see what we are doing, and hopefully help us by giving us information as to whom has lived in your house over the years.

NEIGHBOURHOOD PLAN -On Saturday and Sunday 10/11 February we held 2 open days in the Village Hall where the results of the Questionnaire and majority of our proposals were displayed on over 80 display boards. Around 50 people attended and completed feedback forms.

On 13 March we met Peak Park Officers to discuss our findings and were encouraged by their response to our Draft Plan. We are now in the process of final amendments, before embarking on a Statutory Consultation phase during which we invite all relevant local and national bodies, such as Natural England, DCC and DDCC to comment on our Plan.

We also ensure that anyone whose land is included in any part of our plan is notified and aware of our proposals. Following this the Peak Park as the Planning Authority will advertise the Plan to the public, including of course all residents and copies of the Draft Plan will be made available in the Village and On-line for anyone who wishes to read the Draft in detail.

The final stage is to submit the Plan to a Neighbourhood Planning Inspector who will decide if the plan meets the requirements of planning law and can be put forward to a referendum of all villagers on the electoral roll. If a majority are in favour, the Plan will become part of the National Parks planning policy.

The above processes take several months, but the bulk of the hard work is now behind us. In this I would particularly like to thank Chris Dullage, Janet Bray, Richard Gregory and Keith Quine for their invaluable help and assistance in getting to

this stage and Leon Goodwin for his technical expertise and time. DAVID ANNAT

Hartington C of E Primary School- This has been a very short term made even shorter with the snow interruptions. However, we have managed to ensure that all activities have been completed successfully. We continue to have Worship delivered regularly by MAST as well as Celebration Worships which include a celebration of the children's achievements alongside the act of worship.

The Community Lunches continue to be very well attended. A special Easter lunch was held on 23rd March which was preceded by the joining of the school and the community, where the presentation of the British Heart Foundation shield was awarded to the School for the 7th Year running by raising the grand total of £2003.50 in a competitive swimathon. This was presented to the proud representatives of the school council by the 'Oldest child in the school', Mr John Dean.

The PTA met on the 7th March and have planned a fund raising event which will include the annual Maypole Dancing and other exciting activities. Several of the children were an integral part of the Mothering Sunday Service and helped distribute the posies at the end of the service. On 16th March, Mrs Broomhead took 4 of the children to the PE Conference at Anthony Gell School, Wirksworth where they were trained to become School Sports Organising Crews. We continue to participate in the competitions and festival with Biggin Primary School as BIGGHARTS.

We are very fortunate to once again secure the professional services of Rachel Wilkes from Music Partnership, to deliver curriculum music and singing for the spring and summer terms which will culminate in a performance before the end of the academic year. During the final term the children will be attending a programme of swimming lessons. Gardening Club will be in full swing as we help prepare the plants for the village planters as well as grow our own vegetables. The club will be working closely with the upper junior children to support their curriculum topic of 'Allotments'.

Gravestones-It's the wobble not the angle!

-Some of the gravestones in Biggin Churchyard have been fitted with warning labels by the District Council, because they are potentially unsafe. It is not the angle they are leaning at but the wobble factor.

A full list of tagged memorial stones is on display in the church porch. The council have advised that, if a stone that you feel responsible for, has a label then it should be checked by a monumental mason for safety. The label can be removed if the stone is not a risk, otherwise families have the option of either having the gravestone made safe or the PCC laying the stone flat once the district council has re-assed.

Biggin Primary School- This very short Spring Term has been disrupted by several events. Firstly, the boiler in the KS1 building broke and it took two weeks and six or seven visits from the heating contractors before the “correct sort of engineer” arrived to sort the problem. Fortunately, the heating was working well before the next disruption: snow!

We lost no more time than other local schools and have one family to thank for ensuring the driveway was cleared to enable us to reopen on Monday, 5th March.

Now the challenge is pupil and staff absence due to illness! However, we are the fortunate ones. For the first seven weeks of this term we had two

Greek children at school. The difficulties of moving to a new country and attending a school where no one speaks your language became very clear. But I was very impressed by the way our children accepted them, helped them understand and join in. The ability of the Greek children to understand English and begin to express themselves increased enormously during their time with us. Unfortunately, they have now had to move on to another school in another part of the country where I hope they will find some stability.

Special events have been fewer than usual. Y4,5,6 pupils are enjoying some excellent dance tuition with Jose Oliva while Y3 have Yoga lessons. We are very lucky to be able to have support from Jose and benefit from his enthusiasm and experience. Once again, I am running the popular Discovery Club using Logi-blocs and Kapla bricks. Claire Kilner is also continuing with Music Club and Violin lessons for all Y3 pupils. In January, Teresa Nicholls was appointed as the next Head of Biggin School. She has already spent some time in school, getting to know the children and staff. We will have plenty of other opportunities to work together to ensure there is a smooth transfer in September.

Biggin WI - The meeting planned for February was the rearranged Christmas meal which was cancelled due to the snow in December. This took place at the Newton House Hotel, everyone enjoyed the evening and belated Christmas gifts were given out. A big thank you to all the team at Newton House for a lovely night.

March saw us back in the village hall for a short business meeting, many things were discussed

including a trip on the canal in Cromford and the Group meeting.

Members had plenty of fund raising ideas and these will be posted later in the year on our website. Our speaker for this evening was talking about astrology charts and how he could tell a person's character, based on the day and time they were born.
