#### CHILDREN IN NEED SUPPORT HYPAC

The last edition's "front page" focused on the sad closure of Earl Sterndale Chapel with many memories of how the impact of communities working together had on the lives of so many in the past.

This edition our focus is on the future of our communities, the impact of young people and the opportunities for them to flourish.

For 17 years, the Hartington Young Peoples Activity Club (HYPAC) has been a cornerstone for youth in the community, offering countless young people from Biggin, Bakewell, Warslow, Sheen, Monyash, and Hartington opportunities to grow, learn,



and make a difference. With the vision of "Accessible Opportunities for Young People- led by Young People," HYPAC has seen its fair share of ups and downs, but the impact has been undeniably positive.

A vital contributor to HYPAC's success is Olivia Williams, a dedicated leader whose quality programming has



helped participants develop essential life skills while enhancing their physical and mental wellbeing. Olivia started with us as a participant who grew through the programme and is now our main leader who is employed in the sector. Many young leaders who have passed through HYPAC are now in their 20s, having made significant contributions to the club and their communities.

Recognizing HYPAC's "pedigree," Children in Need has awarded the club a £5000 grant, securing its future for the next few years. This funding will support a diverse range of activities, including multi-skills, traditional sports, outdoor adventures, fencing, OZBOXING, practical first aid, arts and crafts, cooking, and more. Many of these activities take place in the Hartington Village Hall, school playground, and the surrounding countryside, reinforcing the club's core values of RESPECT, TEAMWORK, and CARING.

With annual running costs of £2200-£3000, the grant ensures the club can continue to hire facilities, bring in external

deliverers, provide transport, and purchase equipment. The club operates thanks to the dedication of volunteer leaders, with membership costing just £30 for a 10-week term, three terms per year.

HYPAC's 2024/25 programme kicks off on Monday, September 23rd, at 5:30 PM in the Hartington Village Hall. Open to children aged 6 to 12, with opportunities to become young leaders after this age, the club invites everyone to come along and experience the fun, learning, and community spirit HYPAC has to offer.

As the saying goes, "Use it or lose it"—so why not give HYPAC a try? All are welcome!

**Vicar letter-** Within the White Peak group of parishes there are currently many challenges. Life has been tough over the past few years whether it's involved managing the impact of the on-going cost of living crisis; fragile transport and communication links; our amenities struggling because of an aging population; or simply being priced out of business. Our schools, churches, village halls, pubs, post offices and shops are the glue that keep our communities together. They're the places where we meet, create memories and help to grow our rural economies. They are the hubs where friendships are forged, and traditions are grown. In an era that puts a price on everything and where bigger is often regarded as better we need to protect the civic structures that serve our villages both as individuals, as communities and neighbouring parishes. When local amenities and traditions disappear, they leave the villages they once served poorer for their absence.

A shared focus and vibrant community are good for our mental health, reinforce our sense of self and gives life to the places where we live. Various surveys and studies reflect the fact that the more we engage with spaces where we live the greater the positive emotions we have about that place and ourselves. And there is so much going on – just look at what HYPAC is doing; the developing Live Stronger for Longer Programme; and the various village groups who want more of us to engage with one another and the world around us. We are better together when we share our company, our skills and our time. The whole is greater than the sum of its individual parts. When we work together, we can do almost anything.

If we choose not to support our amenities, if we choose to go elsewhere or not to engage at all – whether we're permanent residents, seasonal ones, incomers or have lived here all our lives- then we run the risk of losing those aspects of living in a village that are beyond price, or else having unwelcome changes imposed upon us from afar. A dormitory settlement is one where people sleep but travel elsewhere for everything else. That is not the definition of a community - it has no heart and no soul. In other words, there is no love. When it comes down to it, it's up to all of us to engage with our communities, to keep the glue that holds them together, and the things that make our villages what they are, working. Challenges become opportunities only if we, and the places where we live, thrive.

**Hartington Surgery Flu vaccines**- It may be a little early to mention flu vaccinations, but with the year ticking along a reminder of our process is below.

Flu vaccines will be offered to:

- > all patients aged 65 years and over
- patients aged 6 months to under 65 years in clinical risk groups
- children aged 2 or 3 on 31st August 2024
- pregnant women

Flu clinics at the Practice will take place during October. We aim to offer pre-booked appointments for flu vaccines, at a variety of times during the day, including late evenings on Mondays, to assist working patients who may struggle to attend during regular working hours. All eligible patients will receive an invite to book an appointment. A generic NHS reminder will be sent first followed by contact from the Practice as soon as we have delivery dates of the vaccines confirmed. Contact from the Practice could be by text message, letter or phone call.

**Conserving water in your garden** This summer has seen heavy downpours interspersed with hot dry days that can be a challenge to enthusiastic gardeners who need to water planters and pots. The good news is that the erratic weather patterns do give gardeners more opportunity to capture and store rainwater - which will help to reduce water bills. Water butts can be easily attached to down pipes on houses and outbuildings. These days butts come in all shapes and sizes. Make sure that the butt has a well secured lid to prevent mosquitos

from breeding and birds from drowning. The best advice is to water the base of a plant rather than spraying a large area and don't forget to mulch up with wood chips as this helps to retain water as well as prevent weed growth.

**New planters for Biggin & a reminder about the seed swap-** The parish council has given Biggin's wildflower group funds for two planters to be placed near the bus stop on Main Street and another on Drury Lane. They will contain herbs and wildflowers.

The Coffee, Cake and Chat seed swap remains in operation in the Biggin Telephone Exchange. People are welcome to take any of the seeds in the box if they have a use for them and if you have packets of seed, even if they have been partly used, that you no longer want please consider donating them at the exchange. The book swap welcomes any gardening or wildlife books if you are having a clear out.

# Hartington Wildflower Group Clearing blanket weed from the Mere

As part of the ongoing management of the village pond, regular clearing of blanketweed continues to take place. Once removed it is left by the side of the pond to allow any aquatic life to return to the water, and then once dried out it is removed for composting.

In order to help keep the blanketweed under control, barley straw bales have been introduced and volunteers will be regularly monitoring the health of the Mere over coming months. Thank you again to all of the volunteers who help out.
